- 2. Equal and inclusive access to healthcare provision and support for independent living, with control over the best use of resources, including support for disabled children.
- 3. Equal and inclusive access to education, paid employment and an appropriate income and support whether in or out of work.
- 4. Equal and inclusive access to the justice system without fear of being unfairly judged or punished, and with protection of personal and private rights.

Social Work Scotland is in agreement with the four outcomes and is committed to working with partners to create the optimal environment for supporting disabled people to participate fully in society and live their life with control, freedom, choice and dignity. The statements fit with Article 8 of the European Convention on Human Rights- ie "...the right to private and family life...to work...to live with

dignity..". Achieving the ambitions within the 'Delivery Plan' will involve making change to physical environments as well as to the way systems and policies operate. Local governance is required to ensure that the best local solutions are found to meet the outcomes. Social Work Scotland agrees with the statement in COSLA's document on strengthening local democracy 'Local Matters', that human rights must be respected and cannot vary from locality to locality. Furthermore that a strengthened local democracy, 'supported by appropriate aggregation and sharing' will provide the best environment for delivering on ambitions for tackling inequality. Social Work Scotland is of the view that the outcomes, as with Single Outcome Agreement's and the findings within the Christie Commission report, 2011, can only be effectively delivered through such inclusive, locally-based democratic decision making. Engaging people who use services as 'equal and experts' within the local context will lead to better informed planning and general decision making. The need for an increased focus on community planning is enshrined in 'The Community Empowerment (Scotland) Bill.
